Section 2: Assessment Process

Certification Body:

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BSI is a leading global provider of management systems assessment and certification, with more than 92,000 certified locations and clients in over 193 countries. BSI is the UK's National Standards Body. BSI provides independent, third-party certification of management systems. BSI is ASI Accredited (ASI-ACC-067) to conduct RSPO assessment since 31/10/2014 with accredited office located at Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

2.1 Assessment Methodology, Programme, Site Visits

The on-site assessment was conducted on 25-27 March 2024. The audit programme is included as Section 2.3. Where applicable, prior to the initial certification and recertification audit, 30 days Public Notification was made through the RSPO and BSI website on 6th Feb 2024.

The approach to the audit was to treat the independent smallholders as an RSPO Certification Unit. A range of occupational health and safety, environmental, best practice management, and social factors were covered. This includes consideration of topography, palm age, proximity to areas with HCVs, declared conservation areas, local communities engagement and workers welfare and safety.

The Critical NC close out on-site assessment was conducted on 3 Jul 2024. The audit programs are included in Section 2.3.

The methodology for collection of objective evidence included physical site inspections, observation of tasks and processes, interviews of staff, workers and their families and external stakeholders, review of documentation and monitoring data. Independent Smallholder Standard 2019 was used as the normative reference to assess compliance. The comments made by external stakeholders were also taken into account in the assessment.

The minimum sample size is four estates. Sample size for certification unit with more than four (4) estates were determined based on formula $N = (\sqrt{y}) \times (z)$ where y is the number of estates and where z is the multiplier defined by risk assessment. While, the sampling of smallholders were based on the formula $(\sqrt{y}) \times (z)$; where y is total number of group member and where z is the multiplier defined by the risk assessment. The sampled smallholder listed in Appendix E.

Meetings were held with stakeholders to seek their views on the performance of the Chaiburi Oil Palm Collaborative Farming Community Enterprise with respect to the RSPO requirements and aspects where they considered that improvements could be made. At the start of each meeting, the interviewer explained the purpose of the audit followed by an evaluation of the relationship between the stakeholder and the company before discussions proceeded. The interviewer recorded comments made by stakeholders and these have been incorporated into the assessment findings.

Structured worker interviews with male and female workers and staff were held in private at the workplace in the estates. Fieldworkers were interviewed informally in small groups in the field. In addition, the wives of workers and staff were interviewed in informal group meetings at their housing. Separate visits were made to each of the local communities to meet with the village head and residents. Company officials were not present at any of the internal or external stakeholder interviews. A list of Stakeholders contacted is included as Section 3.4.



The non-conformities for this audit are detailed in Section 3.3 and unless it is stated in this section, all previous nonconformities including minor nonconformities are remains closed.

This report is structured to provide a summary of assessment finding as provided in Appendix A. The assessment was conducted based on risk based approach sampling and therefore nonconformities may exist.

For Initial, Re-certification and Extension of Scope assessment, the report was externally reviewed by approved external peer reviewer prior to certification decision by BSI.

For Annual surveillance assessment, the report was internally reviewed and approved by BSI qualified certification reviewer.

3.4 Stakeholders and previous land owner / user consultation

Stakeholder consultation involved internal and external stakeholders. External stakeholders were contacted by telephone to arrange meetings at a location convenient to them to discuss that Chaiburi Oil Palm Collaborative Farming Community Enterprise Certification Unit's environmental and social performance, legal and any known dispute issues.

Meetings were conducted with stakeholders to seek their views on the performance of the company with respect to the RSPO requirements and aspects where they considered that improvements could be made. At the start of each meeting, the interviewer explained the purpose of the audit followed by an evaluation of the relationship between



the stakeholder and the company before discussions proceeded. The interviewer recorded comments made by stakeholders and later was verified with the management team. Any comment which is not complying to the RSPO ISH standard requirements have been incorporated as an assessment finding.

Structured worker interviews with male and female workers and staff were held in private at the workplace. Fieldworkers were interviewed informally in small groups in the field. In addition, the wives of workers and staff were interviewed in informal group meetings at their housing. Separate visits were made to each of the local communities to meet with the village head and residents. Company officials were not present at any of the internal or external stakeholder interviews. Principle 4: Protect, conserve and enhance ecosystems and the environment

Protect the environment, conserve biodiversity, enhance ecosystems and ensure sustainable management of natural resources.

Preamble



High Conservation Value (HCVs) and High Carbon Stock (HCS) forests

This Independent Smallholder Standard is pursuing the objective of the RSPO Smallholder Strategy to increase smallholder inclusion, prioritise improved practices which also benefit smallholder livelihoods, whilst also upholding the core sustainability requirements. This includes the protection of areas of HCV and HCS forests. The RSPO has developed a simplified HCV methodology for identifying, protecting and managing HCVs that provides guidance for both existing and new planting (see here).

Aligned with the new HCS requirements in the RSPO 2018 P&Cs, the RSPO, in consultation with the HCSA Steering Group, intends to develop a simplified combined HCV-HCS approach to identify and protect HCS forests. The simplified and combined HCV-HCS approach for independent smallholders will be open to public consultation and will be published no later than November 2020.

In the meantime, independent smallholders are not allowed to clear any primary forests or any areas required to protect or enhance HCVs and HCS forests, as committed by signing the Smallholder Declaration. Until the simplified combined HCV-HCS approach and tool for independent smallholders is available, new plantings will only be permitted in low risk areas. The definition and procedure for identification of low risk areas will be defined by a Smallholder No Deforestation Task Force.

Remediation and Compensation Procedure (RaCP)

Remediation and compensation are required for any clearance since November 2005 without prior HCV assessment (see criterion 4.2) and any clearance since November 2019 without prior HCS assessment.

The requirements as outlined in the RaCP (2015) is not fully applicable for independent smallholders. For independent smallholders, this RSPO ISH Standard is focused on developing an appropriate RaCP mechanism such as on-site remediation (with funding mechanisms to be determined) as this is contextually appropriate to the scale of independent smallholder production and enables independent smallholders to maximise positive environmental impact on-site. The requirement means that quantified liability is disclosed and assessed through a land use change analysis (LUCA) supported by the RSPO Secretariat.

Out of these, only 32 plots have potential non-compliant land clearing after November 2005 prior to HCV assessment and are analysed in this report. The LUCA is performed on all smallholder's area where there was non-compliant land clearance i.e. land clearing after November 2005 without prior HCV assessment reported. The land cover in November 2005 of Chaiburi Oil Palm Collaborative Farming Community Enterprise Group, Thailand that was subsequently converted to oil palm and declared by the group, totalled 74.51 hectares. In this report, all 49 smallholders with 69 plots of Chaiburi Oil Palm Collaborative Farming Community Enterprise, reported to have converted all their land into oil palm. Of these 32 plots were declared to have Oil Palm planted after 2005. The total land area that has been reported as converted to oil palm is 74.94 ha. The total area of all 32 smallholder plots reported by the group is 74.51 ha whereas the reviewer found the total to be 74.94 ha based on the shapefile data submitted by the group. The error per plot (0.01 ha) is within an acceptable margin of error. The FCL of independent smallholders of Chaiburi Oil Palm Collaborative Farming Community Enterprise, Thailand is 0.0 ha, under Chaiburi Oil Palm Collaborative Farming Community Enterprise Group, Thailand that have been identified for remediation action as ISH plots were planted inside the riparian zone of a natural river. Criteria 4.2

Where the existing smallholder plot has been planted and cleared after November 2005 or is on an area identified as HCS forests after November 2019 up to the eligibility period, a RaCP process appropriate for smallholders based on Land Use Change Analysis (LUCA) will be applicable (reference preamble).

Eligibility

Smallholders provide information on all smallholder plots converted and planted with oil palm after 2005, through use of the simplified combined HCV- HCS approach for Smallholders (Refer to appendix 1).

The Chaiburi Oil Palm Collaborative Farming Community Enterprise Group has members who engaged in new planting post-2005. All members added to the scope must undergo disclosure and the Land Use Change Analysis (LUCA) process. Regarding the Smallholder category within the Chaiburi Oil Palm Collaborative Farming Community Enterprise Group, all members have completed the LUCA stage. Onsite remediation of High Conservation Value (HCV) loss is currently not applicable as the RSPO ISH mechanism has not been developed.

For this audit, none of the new members have engaged in new planting post-2005. Existing members with new planting post-2005 completed the HCV disclosure and the LUCA process before being included in the scope of certification. An email from the RSPO Secretariat dated 30/05/2023 confirms that 49 members to be included in this scope of certification have no potential non-compliant land clearance. Separately, the RSPO Secretariat confirmed that the remaining 32 members cleared the LUCA with 0 liabilities, and no remediation is required on 30/05/2023 (for Suratthani province members).

The total raw non-compliant land clearing calculated by the reviewer is 74.94 hectares, and the final conservation liability (FCL) calculated is 0.0 hectares. There are no plots planted inside the riparian zone of a natural river or on steep slopes. Additionally, there are no plots from the Chaiburi Oil Palm Collaborative Farming Community Enterprise planted on peat. Considering the above, the status of the Land Use Change Analysis of Chaiburi Oil Palm Collaborative Farming Community Enterprise Thailand is Satisfactory.




Appendix C: Location Map of Certification Unit and Supply bases
